Six U-46 students earn first place at Illinois Science Olympiad

Six School District U-46 students earned first-place honors at the Illinois Science Olympiad.

Teams from Eastview Middle School in Bartlett, Larsen Middle School in Elgin and Elgin High School competed in April at University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign and were honored at a June meeting of the U-46 school board, according to a news release.

Pratyush Ramesh, who graduated from Elgin High last month, and junior Abhinav Arvind finished first in the anatomy and physiology category. Classmates Aarav Patel and Mahitha Ratakonda, who both graduated last month, finished first in the disease detectives category, which involved epidemiology case studies.

Eastview students Jacob Baca and Melia Ortiz-Tan, who will be eighth-graders in the fall, earned first place in the remote sensing trial event.

Nearly 100 Elgin Area School District U-46 high school students were recognized by the board of education at its June 9 meeting.

The students were honored with an "Accent on Achievement" recognition for their outstanding achievements in the fine arts, on the same evening the district was honored by the board for being named one of the "Best Communities for Music Education."

This is the seventh straight year U-46 has earned the "Best Communities" recognition from the National Association of Music Merchants Foundation, and it was among fewer than 30 school districts in Illinois to receive the honor this past school year.

The recognition is awarded to districts that demonstrate outstanding achievement for providing music access and education to all students.

U-46 Fine Arts Coordinator Jaimie Giraldo and South Elgin High School Choral Educator Amanda Brex-Castillo accepted the Accent on Achievement certificate from the board on behalf of the music department.

In addition, Giraldo also received an Accent on Achievement for being named the "Arts Educator of the Year" by the Elgin Symphony Orchestra, which cited her passion for ensuring all young people have access to arts education.

Of the 98 Accent on Achievement certificates issued by the board, 12 went to students who received a special honor for being selected as All-State Musicians through the Illinois Music Education Association's (ILMEA) competitive audition process. This is the highest musical achievement for high schoolers in Illinois. Selected students performed at the ILMEA's annual music education conference in Peoria earlier this year.

Another 45 students were part of South Elgin High School's honors treble chorus, directed by Brex-Castillo. After submitting an application and audition videos, the chorus was chosen from

among hundreds of applicants as a featured school ensemble to perform at the ILMEA's all-state music festival.

Ellie Jahnke, a May graduate from South Elgin High School, received two Accent on Achievement certificates — for being a member of the All-State Chorus and also for performing with the South Elgin High honors treble chorus. She said taking a choral class as an elective, and being a part of the school's choral groups, provided her with a sense of community.

"It has given me a lot of confidence outside of the classroom," she said. "It has been just a great way for me to grow as a person and as a musician. I've met so many amazing people through it, and it's helped me emotionally and socially."

Two of the students were also honored for their performance in the pit orchestra for the all-state production of "The Prom" at the Illinois High School Theatre Festival. The students submitted audition recordings and were also selected from hundreds of submissions from around the state.

Finally, 41 students either acted in or were a part of the technical crew for South Elgin High School's production of "Anne of Green Gables" that was chosen as a featured school production at the Illinois High School Theatre Festival. Schools apply to the festival to perform, and adjudicators attend each applying production to determine which ones will be selected to perform.

Giraldo said she was pleased that the board was able to recognize so many students excelling in the arts, all on the same evening.

"I have a very happy heart," Giraldo said. "It just makes me so happy to see our fine arts students getting recognized. Sometimes our arts students don't feel that celebration as much as maybe, say, someone competing in sports, and here in U-46, I am proud that we see their efforts and successes and recognize them for their achievements. I'm so proud of them and of our teachers, and so happy to be a part of such a great community here."

District U-46 School Board members Monday approved the purchase of cyber liability insurance policy and discussed the purchase of ChatGPT Edu, an AI product that would be used by teachers, coaches and administrators.

The \$118,283 insurance policy with Tokio Marine HCC would run from July 1 through June 30, 2026, and comes with a \$3 million limit and a \$100,000 deductible, according to documents provided for the meeting.

"U-46's decision to purchase a cybersecurity insurance policy was driven by the growing frequency and sophistication of cyber threats targeting school districts nationwide," Deputy Superintendent of Instruction Lela Majstorovic said prior to the meeting.

It's become necessary, Majstorovic said, because as student and staff data systems become more interconnected, the potential financial and operational risks from a cyber incident have increased significantly.

Meeting documents said that "since 2023, 108 ransomware attacks have impacted over 1,800 schools nationwide. ... According to Alliant Insurance Services, the district's insurance broker, the average ransom demand in 2024 was approximately \$847,000."

"While the district has very strong, state of the art preventive measures in place," Majstorovic said, "insurance offers added reassurance in managing unforeseen events. Purchasing a cybersecurity insurance policy adds a critical layer of financial protection and support in the event of an attack."

At Monday's meeting, Majstorovic and Rola Tarek Mohamed, a research and project management fellow, also continued a board discussion about whether to spend \$432,000 for 4,000 educator ChatGPT Edu licenses with Open AI for the 2025-26 school year.

The system will allow educators "to use AI as a planning assistant, research partner and support tool," Mohamed said at the meeting. The deal would include staff training on how to use the technology.

ChatGPT Edu could allow users to write an email that ensures "it's appropriate to the intended audience," upload curriculum frameworks to create specific tasks, and check that lesson plans align with board-adopted curriculum, among other things, Majstorovic said.

"Any teacher is expected to do this level of planning on an every-single-day basis," she said. "Using a tool like this could really help with navigating that planning."

Time currently being used for such work can free teachers up to do other things, such as thinking about how they are giving kids that "in-the-moment feedback so that they can continue to learn," Majstorovic said.

Mohamed told the board that related AI guidelines prohibit sharing any personal data or using it for grading.

Board member Dawn Martin said she wasn't convinced the technology would be completely beneficial.

"I have a lot of concerns with this, the ethics, the integrity behind AI, the ability of it to take away critical thought, especially if we start rolling it out for students," she said. "Just because something exists doesn't mean embracing it is fully the way (to go)." U-46 Superintendent Suzanne Johnson said, "I think we find ourselves in this really interesting place where we have to start to determine what are the guardrails that we can identify and create, how do we support professional learning, how do we start to do some of that — if it's sooner than later — as it's preparation for this thing that now exists."

Any proposal won't be back for discussion for at least five weeks, Johnson said, so there's time for more board input and feedback.

Super reliever, super steady Zach Readdy has been in and out of the McHenry lineup this baseball season. Monday night, he almost took a pitch out of a minor league ballpark.

Readdy delivered a pair of two-out, two-run hits, Kaden Wasniewski finished with two exciting innings in his first mound appearance in more than six weeks, and McHenry rallied to beat South Elgin 8-6 in the Class 4A Kane County Cougars supersectional at Northwestern Medicine Field in Geneva.

"It was awesome," Readdy said after the Warriors erased an early 4-0 deficit to hike their school-record win total to 35. "Nothing like it."

McHenry (35-4-1) has another chance to experience thrills when it plays Brother Rice in a state semifinal at 7 p.m. Friday at Slammers Stadium in Joliet. McHenry finished fourth in Class 4A in 2022, its first and only appearance at state.

The game marked the final one for South Elgin's Jim Kating, who's been the only head coach for the Storm since the program's initial season in 2007. The Storm finished third in Class 4A in 2014, its only appearance at state.

"We played well, we battled to the end, and I'm very proud of my kids of how they came out," said Kating, whose team was the No. 4 seed in its sectional. "We had nothing to lose. We weren't supposed to be anywhere close to where (McHenry) is at."

South Elgin (25-11) jumped out to an early lead, scoring four runs in the second. Ninth hitter Nathan Kmiec delivered a two-out, two-run single for the game's first runs.

McHenry got three runs back in the third, with Readdy's two-run triple the big blow. He pulled a fastball deep to right field, and the ball bounced off the wall.

He does not have a home run this season.

"It was in on my hands," said Readdy, a St. Xavier commit. "I got a little jammed, but I just muscled it out there. It almost went."

Readdy delivered again in the sixth, lining a go-ahead, two-run double with two out into left-center field to make the score 7-5 in favor of the Warriors.

"I was sitting curveball and I just reacted to it," said Readdy, who hit another fastball. "I was on it, and I put it the other way. It was outside and I went with it."

"Really clutch," said Wasniewski, who was on base three times with a hit by pitch, walk and single. "He's not been in the lineup (consistently) all year, but he really came through for us today."

The sophomore Wasniewski earned the save for Scotty Cole, who pitched 3¹/₃ innings in relief of starter Bryson Elbrecht. Wasniewski walked one but struck out the side in a scoreless sixth with McHenry leading 7-5.

In the seventh, he allowed a leadoff double to Jake Sparacino and then an RBI single to Jacob Robertson. But Wasniewski got a ground out and back-to-back fly outs to center fielder Carver Cohn to end it. "It's so fun to watch him pitch," Readdy said. "Everything he has is gross. He throws hard. Can't ask for anything more."

Wasniewski last pitched in a game April 24. The Warriors then shut down the hard-throwing righty because his shoulder was bothering him.

In warmups Monday, he hit 95 mph on the stadium radar gun. He started his second game in a row at third base after being relegated to designated-hitter duties the past month.

"It feels really good, really fresh," Wasniewski said of his arm. "I pretty much knew that once I got in, my arm would feel great."
