Rationale


- → In 2022, the Association of Illinois School Libraries introduced the Illinois Standards Aligned Instruction for Libraries (I-SAIL) framework to empower students through information, media, digital, and individual literacies.
- → The Media Literacy Act was implemented alongside the I-SAIL framework, underscoring the need to revise the existing curriculum, last published in 2017.
- → The curriculum revision is essential to stay current with educational trends and standards.
- The updated library and media curriculum directly supports this commitment, ensuring students are prepared for an increasingly complex, media-driven world.

Library Paraprofessional Educator	To enable the school librarian to perform professional duties in the area of teaching and learning.	One per each middle school and high school. 40 hours week
