South Elgin shuts out Glenbard South

For most, the storm dissipated shortly after 4 p.m. on Friday night, but unfortunately not for the football players of Glenbard South.

The Storm continued for the Red Raiders until about 9:30 p.m. at the hands of South Elgin's 63-0 Upstate Eight Conference victory.

With so many offensive players making plays for the Storm, it almost seemed too easy for quarterback Ben Karpowicz.

"It's pretty easy (for me). All I have to do is get it in their (teammates) hands and let those guys make plays out there and they just do all the rest," Karpowicz said. "It just goes to show how hard you practice and then it shows up during the game. Next week is going to be a big game for us (vs. Bartlett), so hopefully we can go there and get some revenge from last year."

Storm coach Dragan Teonic felt as if his squad played well in all three phases Friday night -- offense, defense and special teams.

"I thought our defense really played great tonight," Teonic said. "Honestly, I thought we played great in all three phases tonight. We blocked a punt, our offense played consistent, and I'm really proud of the way our defense played pitching another shutout."

South Elgin (7-0, 7-0) scored quickly and often and in multiple ways against Glenbard South (5-2, 5-2). Karpowicz gave the Storm a 7-0 lead with a 1-yard run on a keeper midway through the first quarter. After the Red Raiders punted, senior Marquis Gillespie II took off around the right tackle and ran 85 yards untouched for a 14-0 lead.

On their next possession, South Elgin took over in great field possession on the 30-yard line of the Red Raiders. Four plays later, Corve King took the ball in from 8 yards out, and Alex Norowol took it in again for the two-point conversion for a 22-0 lead.

A fumble by Glenbard South gave the ball back to the Storm and this time Davion Cherwin sprinted for an 83-yard touchdown to put the Storm up 29-0.

The Storm's defense continued to rain down on the Red Raiders, as Cherwin intercepted a pass to give South Elgin the ball back still only midway through the second quarter. Karpowicz scored from the 1-yard line and the Storm led 36-0.

Cherwin scored from 15 yards out and Samuel Robles added an 8-yard touchdown run before the half to give South Elgin a 49-0 lead.

The Storm added two more scores in the second half to close out the scoring. Gillespie II added a touchdown run and Cherwin capped off his night with his third touchdown with just over two minutes to play.

"I think they're (Glenbard South) better than what they showed tonight," Teonic said. "It really all comes down to momentum, and once that starts to shift, it can get out of control pretty quick. We want to be aggressive on our play calls and try to dictate that (momentum). We really tried to use the weather in our favor. The hard ball, the mud, that all played in our favor and I've been on both sides of that. We're looking forward to playing Bartlett next week after what they did to us last year, and we feel we've worked very hard to put ourselves in the position to earn that chance."

Bartlett pulls away from Larkin

Halftime found Bartlett clinging to a precarious 16-10 lead against Larkin. The Hawks repeatedly hurt themselves with penalties and turnovers. But after the break, the Hawks cleaned up their act and pulled away for a 39-10 Upstate Eight victory at Memorial Field.

Tyler Rivelli was the Hawks' workhorse, carrying 27 times for 141 yards and 2 touchdowns.

The defense also came up big for the Hawks (6-1, 6-1). Nicholas Bucaro had 2 of the Hawks' 5 interceptions, including a pick-6 to close out the scoring. Joseph Latrofa had a pick and 2 of Bartlett's 7 sacks.

Bartlett also recorded 2 safeties on high snaps by Larkin.

"We're proud of our guys defensively," said Hawks coach Matthew Erlenbaugh. "We were flying around the football. When they put it up in the air, our guys were reading it well and making plays."

Larkin scored all its points in the second quarter. Adrian Jaramillo's 29-yard field goal got the Royals on the board after they fell behind 16-0 in the first quarter.

On the Royals' next possession, quarterback Dontrell Maxie found Jamarion Stubbs open on a short crossing route. He cut back and saw nothing but daylight, taking it all the way for a 41-yard score.

Stubbs had a huge night with 10 catches for 123 yards.

The Royals got the ball back twice more with a chance to go ahead, but couldn't convert.

After intermission, the Hawks started to wear down the undermanned Royals. Matthew Young returned the second-half kickoff to the Larkin 30. From there, the Hawks needed just 5 plays to score, with quarterback Michael Priami doing the honors himself.

Bartlett then put the game away with 16 fourth-quarter points. Rivelli's second score of the game made it 32-10, and Bucaro erased any doubt about the outcome by picking off a pass at his own 12-yard line and weaving through traffic all the way to the end zone.

"The first half wasn't what we wanted," Erlenbauch said. "It was a little sloppy on our part with penalties and turnovers. So it definitely wasn't the first half we were looking for.

We realized that, hey, we're in a game here, so we need to step up, get our minds right and take one play at a time. That's what we did and came out with a victory."

Priami threw 11 completions for 111 yards, all in the first half, including a scoring strike to Hayden Angell.

In the second half, the Hawks were content to pound the ball behind tailbacks Rivelli and Jordan Snyder. The latter added 77 yards on the ground as the Hawks totaled 259 rushing yards.

Glenbard East shuts out Streamwood for 6th win

A looking at the stat sheet showed that Streamwood's offense dominated in Friday's home finale against Glenbard East.

The Sabres, running their double wing offense, ran 70 plays from scrimmage to the Rams' 44.

However, Glenbard East made the most of its opportunities to pull out a 28-0 Upstate Eight Conference win.

The victory also clinched a playoff berth for the Rams.

"It's tough to defend. If they get a first down, two or three, that can take five, six minutes off the clock," said Glenbard East coach John Walters. "What they do is limit your possessions and when you don't get many touches, it's hard to score touchdowns. We managed to find enough points to win the game."

Walters thought it was a good team win.

"I thought both sides of the ball played pretty well tonight," the Rams coach said. "You shut somebody out so the defense played well and we put up four touchdowns so the offense played well and our special teams also played well."

Glenbard East (6 -1, 6-1) needed only five plays to score its first touchdown in the first quarter. Deon Cook scored the first TD on a 74-yard catch and run pass from quarterback Connor Cerkas with 3:48 left in the period.

The Sabres fumbled the ball on their next possession and Glenbard East recovered on Streamwood's 30-yard. Three plays later, the Rams made it 14-0 on a 1-yard plunge by Benny Miller.

Neither team scored in the second quarter. Streamwood (2-5, 2-5) controlled the ball starting with 3:26 left in the first quarter until 2:40 mark of the second quarter, running 18 straight plays. The drive ended with a fumble at the Rams' 10-yard line.

"I think in the first half, we had opportunities. We gave up two big plays on defense and I think we were in the red zone three times and didn't come across," Streamwood coach Don Guindon said. "Those four, five plays in the game, you change those and we're talking about being up 14-0 instead of being down 14-0."

With 2:08 left in the third quarter, Glenbard East widened its margin to 21-0 on Cook's 5-yard run.

Rogers scored his second TD on an 8-yard run in the fourth quarter.

Streamwood mounted another long drive in the fourth. The Sabres advanced to Glenbard East's 8-yard line with 1.9 seconds left to play. Abdurrahman M'nasri, filling in for starting quarterback Kevin Lunz, who was shaken up on an earlier play, completed Streamwood's only pass of the evening to Sean Thompson. Thompson lateraled it Erwin Morales, who was immediately tackled before crossing the goal line as time expired.
